

### Message from the OVF Election Coordinator

It's time for our annual OVF elections for Board & Phase Rep positions. Members can run for any of the following positions in 2025 (for a two-year

term): Vice Chair, Garden Master, Membership Secretary, Independent Project Manager and Phase Representatives for Phases 1U, 2U, 3U and 4U.

Candidates may submit their names to the Election Coordinator (elections@oceanviewfarms.net).

The election culminates with in-person voting at the April General Meeting, April 12, at 1pm.

In-person voting is preceded by Online and Email voting, which runs from Sunday, March 30 through Friday, April 11 (closing at midnight). Candidates who file for office by sending an email to the Election Coordinator (elections@oceanviewfarms.net) by Friday, March 28 will have their names included on the Online email slate, which is accessed via your member page. Candidates may also file a candidate statement to be included on the website and to be posted on OVF Bulletin Boards; deadline for candidate statements is also Friday, March 28.

Members who attend the April 12 meeting may also be nominated for an office at the meeting, but they will not have the advantage of being included on the website or bulletin board notices preceding the April 12 meeting.

### Message from the OVF Gate Closing Monitor

HAPPY SPRING!! Now that the days are longer and warmer, we're all eager to spend more time in the garden. While it's understandable that some might wish to linger in the evenings to finish up during the twilight hour, I must remind you that the garden officially closes at sunset.

We need to keep in mind that OUR GATE CLOSERS ARE VOLUNTEERS who work to keep our garden safe and secure by locking the sheds and all the gates each night. Most gate closers have children or parents to tend to, are tired after work, or simply have things to do in the evening. If a particular gate closer allows you to linger a few minutes longer, it is their prerogative, not your right.

Any member who is rude to the gate closer or fails to leave in a prompt manner when asked to, could be reported and receive a citation. So please BE RESPECTFUL, FOLLOW THE RULES, AND BE READY TO LEAVE THE GARDEN AT SUNSET. Let's keep our garden a peaceful and enriching space for all to enjoy!

A REMINDER TO ALL GATE CLOSERS: It's important to follow OVF's procedures for gate closers when Little League or film crew members are on the property. Mark your calendars for Saturday, March 29, at 10 AM when OVF members Dean Cleverdon, Nancy Nyberg and Christy Wilhelmi will teach a class on growing tomatoes.

Growing tomatoes? According to the numerous gardening magazines, AI and your Aunt Betty, growing tomatoes is as easy as sticking seeds into a pot and adding sunshine and water. Not so fast, say Christy, Dean and Nancy.

"Tomatoes are challenging to grow at OVF because we have the coastal influence, sandy alkaline soil, and a fair amount of disease persistence at the garden, exacerbated by coastal air," says Christy. Dean concurs. "To Christy's list, I would also add colder weather due to climate change and the abundance of critters now present in the garden create other challenges to growing (and harvesting) tomatoes," he says.

In the past couple of years, many OVF gardeners have had trouble growing tomatoes, prompting education chair Les Hairrell to tap these experts to teach a class. Nancy, who has coordinated over 10 years of OVF tomato tastings, notes that "as long-time OVF gardeners, we have each developed strategies to supplement our soil, optimize plant and fruit growth, while reducing pests and disease in our organic (and often-foggy) setting."

"We have adjusted our growing methods and planting space to optimize the track of the sun for tomatoes which might ripen for up to 100 days," she adds.

Even if you've never had a problem growing tomatoes, the class could be useful, says Dean. "It depends on your knowledge base," he says. "Maybe you will learn something you did not already know – or you can share with others what you already do know."

Nancy and Christy give a preview of what to expect at the class. "From choosing from hundreds of tomato varieties to watering strategies, we hope to encourage OVF gardeners to experiment in their space and grow successfully," says Nancy. Dean notes that OVF offers OVF-specific challenges. "Someone who has a plot halfway up the slope in Phase IV and somebody else is at the top of Upper I have entirely different micro-climates.

The bottom line, says Christy is that "if you come to class you'll learn from those who have dealt with these difficult growing conditions first hand. It's better than reading a garden book written by someone from outside the region."

### OVF Welcomes New Members At Saturday Get Together

On March 22, OVF gardeners gave a warm welcome to some of OVF's newest members. Kip and Sam, a father-son team of gardeners, just got their plot a week before the Saturday event. After being on the wait list for three years, both expressed their happiness at finally getting a spot to "do a bit of gardening." The two, who have home gardening experience, already planted blueberries and plan to grow tomatoes, carrots and a variety of other vegetables.

Of the approximately 30 people at the event, there was also a healthy mix of veteran members, including Susan, a member for 45 years, Mike and Carrie members for 30+ years, and Reza, who has been a member for eight years. "I'm here to meet the new people," said Reza.

A handful of OVF members made food: Keith and Futo cooked up a tasty dish of fried rice and fish curry for attendees; Mateo cooked homemade waffles, which he served with fruit, Nutella and maple syrup; Mitusko made a wonderful flan; and Shirley organized a give-away display of lemons grown in different OVF independent projects and peoples' yards.

Other new members include Dre and Seti, who had been on the wait list for four years; both have experience in regenerative gardening in northern California and Watts. They plan to plant kale, lettuce, watercress, summer squash and attract the pollinator population. Precious, who has been a member since June of last year, grows cabbage, fava beans and native plants —she also attended the first meeting of the Native Plants Club. And André, who was an associate for 3-1/2 years and got his own plot in November, has been growing cabbages, broccoli mustard greens, beets and potatoes. "I have a view of the ocean and the snow-capped mountains," he said. "I've always wanted to grow my own food and share the bounty, and now I have the perfect plot."

# Calling Native Plant Enthusiasts! Twenty Plus OVF Members Attended the First Native Club Meeting on March 9

As you drive up the OVF driveway to the parking lot, you may have noticed

some activity by the fences. What you are seeing is the nascent work of the OVF Native Plant Club.

First, some back story: in OVF's earlier years, the driveway was lined with roses which, largely untended, grew into a muddle of weeds and thorns. Since then, long-time OVF gardener Judith Morris, with her associate Juan Becera, transformed the driveway into a low-water Mediterranean garden which has thrived for years.

Judith recently approached OVF President Shirley Vernale to suggest that the existing garden be renovated with the addition of more California native plants. Arthur Elzy and Sarah Harroff, two OVF members with expertise and interest in native plants, were consulted, and a small working group was formed. Soon, other OVF gardeners saw (or heard about) the native plant initiative and expressed interest in learning and helping.

Meanwhile, OVF Education was developing a class on California native plants, but it became obvious that a single class could only teach so much – and that creating an actual California native garden would be an ideal OVF project. Thus was launched the Native Plant Club, aimed at bringing together OVF members interested in this area of gardening.

The Club is intended as an ongoing opportunity for members interested in native plants to engage with one another and learn through presentations at club meetings as well as by – most importantly -- getting their hands dirty in the new native garden.

Over twenty OVF gardeners attended the first California Native Plant Club on March 9, where they introduced themselves and discussed the driveway project. Club members will earn hours for the time they spend working in the driveway project but not for social events, meetings or presentations.

The next meeting of the native plant club will be May 4 at 1:00 in the main meeting area. If you're interested in getting involved with OVF's native garden and/or joining the club, please contact the OVF President or the OVF Education Chair.
